

1. SECTION A - Pre-Show Inspection - All Breeds

- 1.1. An original Registration Certificate as issued by Canadian Livestock Records Corporation (CLRC) is required for all animals.
 - 1.1.1. The original paper Registration certificate is preferred for all animals. No Photocopies will be accepted.
 - 1.1.2. Animals less than 6 months of age whose registration certificates are applied for, but have not been received by the owner from CLRC may show, providing the owner/agent provides a copy of the application form that was sent to CLRC. New In the event of the online registration of an animal, a screenshot of the application or a paper copy is acceptable.
 - 1.1.3. Animals registered through the bulk paperless can be shown without a paper copy of the registration certificate, <u>provided that the owner/agent bears all responsibility to have the proof of registration available at all times</u>. I.e. providing a mobile device to display the information live from the CLRC website to the show committee. <u>No printed copies of the CLRC webpage accepted</u>.
 - 1.1.4. Should the exhibitor fail to provide such a device (no wireless service, unable to provide a device, CLRC website down for maintenance etc.) the show Committee is to disqualify the animal from the show. (Disqualified animals are not counted in the numbers).
 - 1.1.5. Any foreign-resident animal shown MUST have the Original Registration certificate as issued by a recognized breed association in the country of residence. No Photocopies or Stamped Duplicates will be accepted.
 - 1.1.6. The Registration Certificate (or access to the CLRC website for Bulk Paperless registrations) must be available upon request from the Show Secretary/Show Chairman <u>during the entire show</u>.
- 1.2. Ownership shall be the name on the Registration certificate. Persons, who are showing an animal, whose registration certificate has a signed transfer that has not been processed by CLRC, must show the animal as an agent for the owner shown in CLRC records.
- 1.3. The Show Chairman and the Show Secretary are responsible to ensure that ALL exhibitors entered in the show confirm that all their animals are tattooed as shown on the registration papers. The Show Chairman and the Show Secretary are welcome to perform a random or complete tattoo check at their discretion.
 - 1.3.1. The exhibitors must sign the Tattoo Verification Form, acknowledging that their animal tattoos are correct and available for tattoo check, at the discretion of the Show Committee.
 - 1.3.2. Any tattoos that are not clear to the checker should be added to the Re-Check section so the Show Committee may recheck.
 - 1.3.3. If a tattoo is illegible, missing or not exactly as on the registration certificate, the show Committee is to disqualify the animal from the show. (Disqualified animals are not counted in the numbers). Permission to Re-tattoo from CLRC along with the registration certificate must not be accepted.

There is to be NO tattooing done at a CGS sanctioned show.

Note that tattoos must appear in the ears or tail exactly as they appear on the registration form.



- 1.4. All animals must pass a mandatory Health Check prior to the show. Animals failing to pass or missing the inspection cannot be shown.
 - 1.4.1. It shall be the decision of the show Committee as to whether the service of a licensed Veterinarian or a Committee of 3 CGS Members (over 18 years of age) in good standing, shall be used to perform the Health Check in accordance with all other rules as noted. Note: For shows in the USA, a combination of 3 CGS/ADGA/AGS Members may be used instead of 3 CGS Members. This Committee of 3 Members hereby referred as a "Committee of 3"
 - 1.4.2. If a Committee of 3 is used, the following is to be adhered to:
 - 1.4.2.1. All 3 Members shall sign the Health Check Form and print their name clearly beside their signature.

- 1.4.2.2. The advance prize list for the show MUST state that a Committee of 3 CGS/ADGA/AGS Members in good standing will conduct the Health Check.
- 1.4.2.3. If a Veterinarian is used, it is up to the show Committee to make sure that the veterinarian reads, understands, and signs the CGS health check form. A designated person must accompany the veterinarian on his/her rounds. If the veterinarian has missed something, for example a "lump," it is up to the show Committee to point this out to the veterinarian.

2. SECTION B - Show Sanctioning and Fees

- 2.1. The classes, rules, and restrictions published for any given show must be an exact duplicate in their entirety of those sanctioned by the CGS Office and shall state "CGS Rules Shall Govern".
- 2.2. The local show Committee/sponsoring organization may include show rules of their own to be used in addition to the CGS rules to insure orderly conduct and cooperative behavior by the exhibitors. They may also set reasonable penalties for violation of such rules. These rules only apply if not covered by CGS.
- 2.3. The sanctioning fee must be submitted with the application form at least 40 days prior to the date of judging or an additional **late fee of \$100.00 plus courier costs** will be applied. Applications not received more than 10 business days before show date will result in a **\$200.00 late fee plus courier costs**. The cost of rosettes, and/or certificates **MUST** accompany the application.
- 2.4. The base date for computing the age of an animal must be the day the animal is to be judged unless otherwise stated by a fair board in its rules governing livestock. This date must be stated on the sanction application and in the livestock rules.
- 2.5. Show applications received at the CGS Office within 21 days before the show will be processed as quickly as possible, however there is no guarantee that the show Committee will receive the awards and Report of Awards in time. If a Report of Awards, health check form, tattoo check form, and AOP Insurance form (if applicable), are obtained and completed correctly, the legs will be awarded.
- 2.6. Show within a Show: CGS sanctioned shows held within the judging and classes of another CGS sanctioned show are not allowed. (This is considered a show within a show).
- 2.7. ALL OTHER PUREBRED DAIRY When application for a show sanction is submitted, the optional A.O.P. insurance (if desired) MUST be applied for at the same time. In the event two or more breeds do not obtain sanction status in their individual breeds prior to the start of the show, they may be combined under the A.O.P. Sanction upon the unanimous written consent of all the exhibitors of the affected breeds. The written consent must be completed on the form supplied by the CGS office and signed by the affected exhibitors, the show chairperson and the show secretary. If the individual breed class is not run, it becomes part of the A.O.P. class. The Judge must submit the consent form to the CGS office along with the show Report of Awards. A.O.P. insurance must be applied for when the show application is submitted to the CGS office.
- 2.8. ALL OTHER PUREBRED DAIRY In shows where a standard A.O.P. is already sanctioned, and in the event that any other breed separately sanctioned does not obtain sanction status prior to the start of the show, they may be added to the A.O.P. division with the written consent of all the exhibitors concerned. This would include the exhibitors already entered in the A.O.P. division and those exhibitors in the affected breed. The written consent of all the affected exhibitors must be completed on the form supplied by CGS and signed by the show chairperson and the show secretary. If **the individual breed class is not run, it becomes part of the A.O.P. class.** The consent form must be sent to the CGS office by the Judge along with the show Report of Awards. **A.O.P. insurance must be applied for when the show application is submitted to the CGS office.**

3. SECTION C - Rules Governing Show Officials and Judges

- 3.1. It is the responsibility of the show Committee to have a copy of these rules available at all times in case any question arises during the course of the show. Show rules can also be found on the CGS website, <u>www.goats.ca</u>, if you would like to retrieve it on your electronic device.
- 3.2. It is the responsibility of the Judge to send the following to the CGS Office within 10 days after the show.
 - Report of Awards
 - Health Check Form
 - Tattoo Check Form
 - > A.O.P. Consent Form (if applicable)

- 3.3. The individual show Committee is responsible for enforcing CGS Rules and certifying that the standards set forth in these rules have been met. In turn, the sponsoring organization is responsible for the actions of the entire show Committee.
- 3.4. All shows officially sanctioned by the Canadian Goat Society MUST be judged by a person currently and officially licensed by the CGS with strict adherence of CGS rules. A Judge from outside Canada may be used, permitting those persons are fully licensed by ADGA and NPGA and are eligible to Judge in Canada. Individuals of comparable background, experience and qualification from another nationally recognized goat association may be allowed to judge a CGS Sanctioned show upon review of the BOD on a case by case basis. Shows must send a written request to the CGS office naming the proposed judge and describing the qualifications of the judge at least 90 days before the show date.
- 3.5. The designation "OFFICIAL CGS SHOW" shall be posted clearly at the show.
- 3.6. No person shall Judge any animal in which he/she has a financial interest or is owned by a Member of his/her immediate family. (Immediate family shall be defined as a parent, children, sibling, grandparent, grandchildren, or a co-habitant.) Financial interest shall be defined as owner, part owner, partner, lessee, and lessor at present or any agreement involving that animal in which the Judge may stand to gain financially.
- 3.7. Exhibitors should wear neat and clean clothes. Plain white costume is preferred, black bottoms and white top are accepted.
- 3.8. DAIRY & PYGMY: Animals with natural HORNS must NOT be shown.
- 3.9. **PYGMY**: Judges are to measure height at withers (with head held above withers) and cannon bone as they enter the show ring. Animals not conforming to the breed standard may be shown, but will be faulted. New (See appendix 13.9 for minimum and maximum wither heights and cannon bone lengths)
- 3.10. **NIGERIAN DWARFS**: The Judge is to measure the Nigerians at height of withers (with the head held above withers) as they enter the show ring. Animals not conforming to the breed standard may be shown, but will be faulted. New The show committee is responsible for having acceptable tools for measurement at sanctioned shows for Pygmy and Nigerian Dwarfs. Animals should be measured on a hard level surface

4. SECTION D - Arrangement of Classes and Making of Awards

Official Dairy CGS Shows may sanction classes for the following breeds and divisions

- > Alpine, La Mancha, Nigerian Dwarf, Nubian, Oberhasli, Saanen, Toggenburg and/or Recorded Grades
- > All Other Purebred (A.O.P.)
- > Combined Purebred (Where no other breeds are separately sanctioned)
- 4.1.If the All Other Purebred class is applied for, no more than 5 other breeds above, may be applied for. This means that two other breeds have to be sanctioned with the A.O.P. All classes sanctioned must be held if any of the breed are present, and no breed may be combined after the show has been sanctioned, unless the A.O.P. optional insurance in SECTION B SHOW SANCTIONING FEES, DAIRY 2.7 & 2.8 has been applied for. 4.2. Any doe 871/2% or higher must show in the Purebred class.
- 4.3. ALL Recorded Grades does under 87.5%, Experimental, URG and Native on Performance (NOP), **must** be shown in the Recorded Grade classes. (Females only)
 - 4.3.1. URG and NOP of unknown birth date must be shown in the oldest age class of either the Junior or Senior division.
- 4.4. Champion Challenge Class: This class is optional. There may be one class per breed. If the class is held, the following rules MUST apply.
 - a) Permanent Champions MUST show in the Champion Challenge Class.
 - b) Any show offering premium money must also do so for the Champion Challenge classes. The amount must at least equal the maximum scale of premiums offered in any class of that breed.
 - c) Where no premium money is paid, the award must at least equal the top awards given in any class of that breed division including the award given the Grand Champion of the breed.
 - d) The Grand Champion of the same breed MUST be shown in the Champion Challenge class and the winner of this class must be called the "Best of Breed". If the Grand Champion of the day DOES NOT win this class, she must NOT compete in the Best in Show class, and the winner of the Champion Challenge shall.
 - e) The Judge must place all animals in this class. Winner of this class must be recorded on the Report of Awards

- f) Permanent Champions shown in these classes must not be barred from Group Classes or Udder Classes.
- g) The total number of goats shown does not include the Champion Challenge class.
- h) Proof of Championship shall be the Presentation of the Permanent Certificate issued by CGS or written verification from the CGS office that the animal is a Champion.
- i) Exhibitors who are only showing animals within the Champion Challenge Class are not to be included in the final count of exhibitors on the Report of Awards.
- 4.5. An animal must compete only once in the age classes of an individual show.
- 4.6. All group classes of a breed must be made up of only those animals that have been shown in the individual classes (includes Champion Challenge class) of that breed in that individual show.
- 4.7. An official CGS Rosette or Certificate **MUST** be awarded to the Grand Champion and the Reserve Grand Champion of each breed separately sanctioned in a Junior, Senior or Open CGS Show.
- 4.8. a) Entries must NOT be added to or withdrawn from classes, without the permission from the officials in charge, after the class is in the ring and the judging has started.
 - b) Once the class is placed and the Judge has begun to give reasons, the class is complete and will not be added to or re-run under any circumstances.
- 4.9. In classes where there is no competition, awards must be made by the Judge according to the merit of the animal.
- 4.10. At shows designated by the Board of Directors as East or West National Shows each year,
 - a) DAIRY- there must be no less than 4 milking classes offered per breed.
 - b) ANGORA there must be no less than 4 fleece classes offered.
 - c) PYGMY there must be no less than 4 classes offered.
- 4.11. At shows designated by the Board of Directors as East or West National Shows each year, there must be no "BEST IN SHOW" class.

PYGMY AND ANGORA

Sanctioned Pygmy and Angora shows require Judges specifically approved to Judge these breeds. There is NO Best in Show for Pygmy or Angora goats. A Report of Awards will be issued to the Show Secretary.

5. SECTION E - Junior Shows, Divisions and Championships

DAIRY & PYGMY: Any Doe that is under 24 months of age that has never freshened must compete in the Junior Division or Junior Doe Show. Junior Doe Shows must have at least 2 age classes.

BUCKS: Any Buck under 12 months of age must be shown in the Junior Division of an Open Buck Show. Junior Buck Shows are not sanctioned.

ANGORA: A Junior animal is one that is in its first or second fleece or under 1 year of age.

5.1 JUNIOR SHOWS – CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 5.1.1. The 1st and 2nd place animals from each class compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
- 5.1.2. The Grand Champion is chosen from the 1st place lineup and moved out of line. The animal standing second to that animal moves into the 1st place lineup. The Judge then chooses the Reserve Grand Champion from the animals in the first lineup.

6. SECTION F - Senior Shows, Divisions and Championships

DAIRY: Any Doe that has freshened must compete in the Senior division. Dry Senior Does (not presently in milk), MUST NOT be shown. Any doe over the age of 24 months that has never freshened must not be shown.

PYGMY: Any Doe that has freshened must compete in the Senior division. Dry Senior Does (not presently in milk), MUST BE shown and are counted in the number of Seniors.

BUCKS: Any Buck 12 months of age or over must be shown in the Senior division of an open buck show.

ANGORA: Any doe in at least its third fleece or over one 1 year of age must be shown in the Senior division.

6.1 SENIOR SHOWS – CHAMPIONSHIPS

There shall be at least two age classes in a sanctioned Senior doe show.

- 6.1.1. The 1st and 2nd place animals from each class compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
- 6.1.2. The Grand Champion is chosen from the 1st place line up and moved out of line. The animal that stood 2nd to that animal moves into the first place line up and the Judge then chooses the Reserve Grand Champion from the animals in the first line up.

7. SECTION G – Open Shows: Divisions and Champions

An Open Show consists of both Junior and Senior animals combined, from at least two age classes, and not separately sanctioned. All 1st and 2nd place Junior winners in individual classes must be presented for selection separately. Then at the discretion of the Judge and Exhibitor, these Junior Champions may compete against the 1st and 2nd place Senior winners for the overall Breed Championship.

Note: A separately sanctioned Junior and Senior show CANNOT be combined to become an Open Show. This would be considered a show within a show.

7.1 OPEN SHOWS – CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 7.1.1 The 1st and 2nd place animals from ALL the Senior classes must compete for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion. At the discretion of the judge, the Junior Champion and Junior Reserve Champion may be placed in the Championship lineup.
- 7.1.2 The Grand Champion shall be chosen from the 1st place lineup. This animal moves out of the lineup and the animal standing in 2nd place moves up to the 1st place lineup. The Judge then chooses a Reserve Grand Champion from the animals in the first lineup. These will be your Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion for the Open Show.

8. SECTION H – Selection of Grand Champion & Reserve Grand Champion

8.1 GRAND CHAMPION

The Grand Champion shall be selected from a class made up of the following:

- 8.1.1 The 1st and 2nd place animals in a separately sanctioned Junior or Senior show and selected from the first place lineup.
- 8.1.2 In an Open Show, where the Junior and Senior are not separately sanctioned, the lineup for Grand, is all 1st and 2nd place animals in the Senior Division, with the optional Junior Champion and Junior Reserve Champion (see 7.1.1), and selected from the first place lineup.

8.2 RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION

The Reserve Grand Champion shall be selected from a class made up of the following:

- 8.2.1 The 1st and 2nd place animals in a separately sanctioned Junior or Senior show and selected from the 1st place lineup where the animal standing 2nd to the Grand Champion has moved up into the 1st place lineup.
- 8.2.2 In an Open Show where the Junior and Senior are not separately sanctioned, the lineup for Reserve Grand is all 1st and 2nd place animals in the Senior division, with the optional Junior Champion and Junior Reserve Champion (see 7.1.1), and selected from the first place lineup which would include the animal that stood 2nd to the Grand Champion

SECTION 9 - Winning a Leg towards a Championship

- 9.1 To receive credit for a leg towards Permanent Championship status, an animal MUST have legible tattoos before it enters the show. The tattoo(s) MUST match the one(s) recorded on the registration certificate.
- 9.2 Permission to re-tattoo from CLRC along with the registration certificate is NOT allowed.
- 9.3 The Judge must disqualify the win, remove the official CGS certificate/rosette, and move the Reserve Grand Champion up to Grand Champion if ANY of the following are present:
 - 9.31 No tattoo
 - 9.3.2 Illegible tattoo
 - 9.3.3 Tattoo does not match the registration certificate
- 9.4 A CGS certificate or rosette must be awarded to ONLY one Grand Champion and one Reserve Grand Champion per breed per sanction when an official CGS show is held.
- 9.5 An animal winning 3 legs under the conditions set forth in this section shall become a Permanent Champion and shall be entitled to the "CH" designation.
- 9.6 Only 1 leg towards a Permanent Championship may be won by an animal at a single show. At least 2 legs must be won under different Judges.
- 9.7 Any disqualified animal MUST NOT be included in the total numbers shown. This includes animals disqualified by the show Committee, Veterinarian, or Judge.
- **9.8** The primary condition for all legs is that there MUST be 10 or more animals of the breed, owned and shown by at least 2 exhibitors, in each separately sanctioned show. Legs are awarded separately for Doe and Buck shows. The only exception shall be for the Best in Show category in the Dairy Goat Show.

9.10 FULL LEGS – DOES

At least two legs of a Doe's Permanent Championship must be full legs and be earned under **ONE** of the following conditions:

DAIRY:

- 9.10.1 The Grand Champion at open shows where at least 8 does of her breed, in milk, are competing in at least 2 age classes.
- 9.10.2 The winner of the Best in Show class at a Senior or open Dairy Goat Show. This class must be comprised of all the breed Champions no absentees permitted and at least two of the competing animals, but NOT the winner, must have met the requirements of rules 9.9 and 9.10.1
- 9.10.3 The Reserve Grand Champion to a breed Grand Champion who was a Permanent Champion as shown by CGS records PRIOR to entering the show ring, and with at least 20 does of her breed in milk, competing in at least 2 age classes
- 9.10.4 The winner in the Senior Division at a restricted show (that is, a show where entry is restricted for ANY other reason than Membership in the National Breed Association, Membership in the officially chartered provincial association, Membership in the sponsoring Fair Board, Membership in a 4H Club) with at least 20 does of her breed in milk, competing in at least 2 age classes.
- 9.10.5 The winner of the Best of Breed Class, when a Champion Challenge Class has been offered. If the winner of the regular class did not qualify because there were less than 8 does in milk but went on to win the Champion Challenge Class, she may earn a full leg as follows:
- 9.10.5.1 The number of animals competing in the Champion Challenge class, excluding the winner, are now added to the number of animals competing in the regular class once the Champion Challenge class has been completed. If the total of the Champion Challenge class plus the regular class meets the requirements of 0 above, the animal will receive a full leg.

ANGORA:

- 9.10.6 The Grand Champion at an open show where at least 8 Senior does are competing in at least two age classes
- 9.10.7 The Reserve Grand Champion to a Grand Champion who was a Permanent Champion as shown by CGS records PRIOR to entering the show ring, and with at least 20 Senior does, competing in at least 2 age classes
- 9.10.8 The winner in the Senior Division at a restricted show, a show where entry is restricted for any other reason than Membership in the National Breed Association, Membership in the officially chartered Provincial Association, Membership in the sponsoring Fair Board, or Membership in a 4H Club, with at least 20 Senior does, competing in at least 2 age classes.

PYGMY:

- 9.10.9 The Grand Champion at open shows where at least 8 Senior does are competing in at least 2 age classes
- 9.10.10 The Reserve Grand Champion to a Grand Champion who was a Permanent Champion as shown by CGS records PRIOR to entering the show ring, with at least 20 Senior does competing in at least 2 age classes
- 9.10.11 The winner in the Senior Division at a restricted show that is, a show where entry is restricted for any other reason than Membership in the National Breed Association, Membership in the officially chartered provincial association, Membership in the sponsoring Fair Board, or Membership in a 4H Club, with at least 20 Senior does competing in at least 2 age classes.

9.11. RESTRICTED LEGS – DOES

Only one leg of a doe's Permanent Championship can be a restricted leg and must be earned under **ONE** of the following conditions:

DAIRY:

- 9.11.2 The Grand Champion in the Senior Division at an open show with at least ten (10) does of her breed but less than eight does in milk.
- 9.11.3 The Reserve Grand Champion to a breed Grand Champion that was a Permanent Champion as shown by CGS records prior to entering the show ring with at least ten (10) does of her breed but with less than 20 does of her breed in milk.
- 9.11.4 The Grand Champion at a restricted show (see definition in 9.10.4 above), with less than 20 does of her breed in milk.
- 9.11.5 The Grand Champion at a Junior doe show.
- 9.11.6 Best Doe in Show at a Junior Dairy Goat Show when at least 2 competing Champions have complied with section I.
- 9.11.7 The Grand Champion Project at a 4H Show if a total of 10 animals of any breed are shown by at least 2 exhibitors.

NOTE: If the Grand Champion at an Open Doe show, is a Junior doe that has never freshened, ONLY a restricted leg is awarded regardless of meeting the requirements of 9.10.1 and 9.10.4 above.

ANGORA & PYGMY:

- 9.11.8 The Grand Champion in the Senior Division at an open show with less than 8 Senior does.
- 9.11.9 The Reserve Grand Champion to a Grand Champion that was a Permanent Champion as shown by CGS records PRIOR to entering the show ring with less than 20 Senior does.
- 9.11.10 The Grand Champion at a restricted show (See definition in 9.10.4 above), with less than 20 Senior does
- 9.11.11 The Grand Champion at a Junior Doe Show
- 9.11.12 The Grand Champion Project at a 4H Show if a total of 10 animals of any breed are shown by at least two exhibitors.

9.16 FULL LEGS – BUCKS

At least 2 legs of a buck's Permanent Championships MUST be full legs and be earned under **EITHER** of the following conditions:

- 9.16.1 The Grand Champion at open shows with at least 10 bucks of the breed and at least 5 senior bucks.
- 9.16.2 The winner in the Best in Show Class (Dairy only) in an Open Show. This class must be comprised of all the breed Champions, no absentees permitted, and at least two of the competing bucks BUT NOT the winner, must have met the requirements of Rules 9.9 and 9.16.1 above.

9.17 RESTRICTED LEGS – BUCKS

Only ONE leg of a buck's Permanent Championship can be a restricted leg and be earned under **ONE** of the following conditions:

- 9.17.1 The Grand Champion at an open show where there were less than 5 bucks aged one year or older but not less than 10 bucks in the breed.
- 9.17.2 The Reserve Grand Champion to the breed Champion that was a Permanent Champion as shown by CGS records PRIOR to entering the show ring, OR
- 9.17.3 The Grand Champion at a restricted show, see 9.10.4.

In order to gain official recognition of legs toward permanent Championship, the animal must be owned by a CGS Member in good standing.

10. SECTION J - Report of Awards

- 10.1 The CGS Office will send the Report of Awards to the individual Show Secretary unless otherwise requested.
- 10.2 The Report of Awards must be completed in its entirety by **ONLY** the Show Secretary, except for signatures. The information for the breed judged must be completed before the judging of the next breed begins. The responsibility for the correct completion of the Report of Awards is the show Secretary's.
- 10.3 The show secretary must take all tattoo information from the Judge as he/she reads it from the animal. The Judge is the **ONLY** authority when reading tattoos on the animal once the animal enters the ring. The actual tattoo as read by the Judge, MUST be shown on the Report of Awards. However, if the tattoo is faded, backwards or otherwise not matching the registration papers, a note to this effect should also be written on the Report of Awards by the show secretary and initialed by the Judge. DO NOT attempt to make the Report of Awards agree with the registration papers. If they do not match, the exhibitor must contact the CGS Office at the earliest possible time for instructions to remedy the problem as owners MUST NOT re-tattoo their animal without permission. If there is no tattoo or registration paper the Judge MUST strip the certificate, medal, or rosette from the Grand Champion and this shall be given to the animal that won Reserve Grand Champion. A note MUST be written on the Report of Awards stating that this has been done.
- 10.4 The owner of the animal (or agent) is responsible for certifying that all information pertaining to the animal has been recorded correctly on the Report of Awards. By signing where indicated on the Report of Awards, the owner/agent's signature confirms that he or she agrees that the information on the Report of Awards corresponds with the registration certificate and that all information to earn a leg has been completed properly on the Report of Awards.
- 10.5 If the owner/agent detects any inaccurate information recorded on the Report of Awards, the correction(s) must be verified and initialed by the Judge.
- 10.6 The Show Chairman and the Show Secretary are responsible for certifying that every detail on the Report of Awards is correct to the best of their knowledge.

- 10.7 The Judge, the Show Secretary, the Show Chairman and the winning Exhibitors must sign the Report of Awards. The Judge must mail the original copy of the Report of Awards along with the Health Check Certificate, Tattoo Check Form, A.O.P. Insurance forms, and any notice of disqualified animals by the show Committee due to paper check problems, directly to the CGS Office within 10 days of judging. One copy of the Report of Awards will be retained by the Show Secretary and one copy retained by the Judge. (Refer to Section C, Rule 2, regarding late penalties)
- 10.8 The Judge must certify that all tattoos on the winning animals are recorded on the Report of Awards EXACTLY as they are tattooed on the animals, and also certify that all of the Best in Show entries are present during the judging of that class. All tattoo spaces provided MUST be filled in. If there is no tattoo, write "NONE".
- 10.9 Animals must not receive credit for a win unless the information is correctly recorded on the Report of Awards and that Report of Awards has been sent to the CGS Office directly from the Judge.
- 10.10 After completion of the show, the Report of Awards must not be added to or altered, in any manner, by anyone.

Report of Awards not being completed in full or incorrectly will result in Champions not receiving legs.

- 28) Judges Name/Signature: The Judge signs to certify that all the tattoos of winning animals are recorded as they are on the animals. New Signatures must be on all pages if the ROA is more than one page.

11. Code of Ethics for Shows

- 11.1 Transportation should be furnished for the Judge. The Judge may be picked up at an airport, train station, bus station by a Member of the Show Committee, sponsoring club, or organization who will not be showing at this show. Otherwise, funds should be provided for car rental or taxi as it suits the particular situation.
- 11.2 Accommodation for the Judge should be made at a local motel/hotel.
- 11.3 Accommodation at an exhibitor's home prior to the show is NOT allowed. Accommodation at someone's home prior to a show is allowed, provided he or she is not exhibiting in the show.
- 11.4 The Judge should not be entertained by anyone prior to the show who intends to exhibit animals at the show.
- 11.5 Do not request a private opinion, on any animal, from the Judge prior to the completion of the show.
- 11.6 Anyone who has purchased an animal directly from a Judge MUST NOT show this animal under that Judge within 6 months of the transfer of ownership.
- 11.7 Anyone who owns an animal in which the Judge has a financial interest, or an animal that resides on the property of a Judge, MUST NOT show this animal under that Judge.
- 11.8 DO NOT offer comments or information to the Judge in the show ring, unless requested specifically by the Judge.
- 11.9 Any person as stated in Section 3.6 of immediate family status must not show animals under such Judges.
- 11.10 Judges SHOULD NOT purchase or sell a goat at a show that they are judging.
- 11.11 Judges SHOULD NOT transport a goat to or from the show site at which they are judging.

12. Complaints and Penalties

12.1 All complaints pertaining to the ethics of the Judges must be referred to the CGS Office within 20 days of the show (in writing) with supporting documentation.

The office must send a copy of the letter to the Judge by registered mail.

- 12.2 All complaints pertaining to the competency of a Judge in the ring must be referred to the CGS Office within 20 days of the show (in writing) with details of the complaint and copied to Judge in question. The office must send a copy of the letter to the Judge by registered mail.
- 12.3 All complaints pertaining to the management of the show or to interpretation of all show rules must be referred to the CGS Office within 20 days of the show (in writing) citing rule infringements and copied to the show Committee. If letter does not show that it's been copied to the show Committee the office will do so.
- 12.4 If the CGS Board of Directors finds a show Committee or a sponsoring organization guilty of conducting a sanctioned show in willful violation of CGS rules, it will recommend actions as follows:
 - I. That the individual Show Chairman and Show Secretary not officiate in any official capacity at an official CGS Show for a period of one year beginning January 1st following the decision of the board;
 - II. The invalidation of wins at the show in question as far as official CGS records are concerned;
 - III. Any other action as deemed necessary and appropriate.
- 12.5 Judges failing to send the complete show package to the office within 10 days from the date of the show will result in a fine of \$50.00 being levied towards the Judge.
- 12.6 If the CGS Board of Directors finds the Judge in violation of any CGS rules, the Board will implement actions as follows:

1st offence - \$100.00 fine 2nd offence - \$250.00 fine

 $3^{\mbox{\scriptsize rd}}$ offence - \$500.00 fine

12.7 All complaints and penalties must be handled in a confidential manner.

(Appendix 13.3) Official Health Check Form

The Canadian Goat Society has instituted the following regulations in an effort to minimize the possibility of disease transmission at our sanctioned shows and to present healthy animals for the public to view.

All animals to be shown at CGS sanctioned shows must have a health check prior to unloading if possible. Any animal found to show evidence of contagious or infectious disease will not be allowed to remain in the show area. Wherever contagion is felt to be a danger, all other animals in that herd group should be disgualified and removed from the show area as well.

Please check for; foot-rot, orf, ringworm, pinkeye, external parasites, clinical mastitis, bloody vaginal discharge and caseous lymphadenitis (lumps whether open or closed must not be shown or accommodated in the goat barn due to the unsightly appearance to the spectators. Exhibitors must not bring any animals with lumps whether they are being shown or not). Animals arriving after completion of the health check are not to be shown, nor are disqualified animals. Specific hours that the health check will be held must be stated in the advance prize list so that all exhibitors may be present.

DO NOT DRAW MILK: This can cause milk let-down in does waiting to be shown. However, if in a particular case, it is necessary to examine the milk, you may ask the owner or handler to draw a sample for you.

The show committee may choose a veterinarian or a committee of three CGS members to perform the health inspection. (Note: for shows held in the USA, 3 ADGA members may be used instead).

1. If the committee of three CGS/ADGA members is used, the following rules must be strictly adhered to: All three persons serving on the Health Inspection Committee must sign this form and print their names legibly beside the signature.

2. The advance prize list sent to exhibitors MUST state, "A committee of three CGS (or ADGA) members in good standing will conduct the health inspection. Exhibitors agree to abide by the decision of the committee." 3. Junior members are NOT allowed to perform the Health Check, but may accompany the 3 CGS members to observe and learn how the Health Check is done.

Please note that Goat Shows are our best means of promoting goats and their products. Exhibitors and Inspectors are asked to cooperate reasonably to ensure that Canadian goats and CGS are presented in a responsible and businesslike manner to Fair Board officials and the public.

The CGS Board of Directors will consider all completely filled National Show bids with the appropriate fees received prior to June 30th. If the CGS Office has not received any National Show bids prior to June 30th, National Show Bids will still be considered after that date, provided they are received in the CGS office six (6) months prior to the date of the show.

The successful bid is responsible for sanction fees and certificate and rosette costs. A complimentary half page advertisement will be placed in a CGS publication in advance of the show.

The host must submit the photos of the Grand and Reserve Senior Champions and Grand and Reserve Junior Champions. The top three placings in each class must be provided <u>at no charge to CGS</u>. Pictures (j-peg or PDF) and placings MUST be sent to the CGS office within <u>60 days</u> of the show for publication in a CGS publication following the show.

If the animal steps badly out of place, she is returned to her position by leading her forward and making a circle back through her position, she is replaced as quickly and inconspicuously as possible. Exhibitors should be natural - Over showing and undue fussing and maneuvering are objectionable.	15
